Chair Report

As Always, when I run my thoughts over the past year, my immediate reaction is WOW it was a busy one. I know that I, and probably all of us, say this every year, but it is true. The refuge sector continues to be one of insufficient resources while dealing with increasing demand. Our work with women and children becomes more complex and our reporting requirements are constantly increasing.

Despite these challenges, I think we all love our work, largely due to the fact that we are aware that it is vital, that we are in a situation where we can work with women and children in such a unique and holistic way and have the incredible opportunity to see them move on with their lives to safety.

CWRG has been involved in several consultations this year while representing the refuge sector and the families we work with. The recognition of Coercive Control as a tool used by PUV's has been very welcome.

Kristin Micallef represented CWRG and 54 Reasons while participating in consultations around the legislation being developed to address these behaviours. Julia Dawson represented CWRG in consultations with the Housing for Women's Safety and Security Alliance, and provided an interview for a newspaper article to further advocate for women's need to access housing and their struggle to do so. Barb Crossing, also from Women's House, agreed to represent CWRG while sitting on the panel at the conference Listen, Connect Reflect. Debbie Bruford from UCC also represented CWRG by attending meetings of the DFV training and change management framework consultations & VAQ financial assistance review.

Many CWRG members have provided Input into the proposed DFV and/or Sexual Assault Peak. As a network we have connected with QCOSS and provided our support of their taking on the development of the Peak body with a view of it moving to an independent body in the future. It is still unclear if the Peak body will be a DFV Peak or if it will represent both the Sexual Violence and DFV sectors.

This year we saw 2 transitional housing services opening specifically for women and children leaving refuge. Peggy's Place and Hannah's Sanctuary are both welcome and positive organizations which will provide additional options to our clients.

The Royal Brisbane Women's Hospital Christmas Appeal took place again last year with funds raised providing children in refuge with Kmart vouchers so they could go to the shop and buy something special for themselves. This is a beautiful project which not only benefits the children in refuge but also raises the community's awareness that there are children in refuge.

This year, in August, our Secretariat Nancy resigned after 4 years in the position.

Nancy has provided incredible support and advocacy to our sector and represented CWRG in many capacities. We would like to say a special Thank you for the hours of work and commitment Nancy has so generously provided in support of CWRG. We would also like to thank Julia for stepping in to take on the position as it demands so much work and commitment

I would like to thank all of the Executive Committee, Bernadette, Cathy, Deb and Kristin for the work they provide. It is always a struggle to fit in meetings and the associated tasks with their core work

Finally, Thank you all for the work you do and your commitment to the women and children you work with. Your work not only changes lives, your work saves lives.

Treasurers Report

Another year has passed for the Combined Women's Refuge Group and 2023 celebrates CWRG's 45th year of operation. These 45 years have seen much change in the domestic and family violence sphere including new legislations, more refuges, increased funding but still so many women and children seek refuge to ensure their safety. The Queensland Police Service report a significant rise in domestic violence incidents within the community in this financial year, rising from 138,928 in 2021/2022 to 171,750.

The current housing crisis is also affecting the refuge sector as rents become more unaffordable, competition between tenants vying for a limited number of affordable properties increases and the supply of social and community housing not keeping up with current demand. Women and children are staying in refuge for longer periods of time, creating a blockage for new referrals.

Challenge DV contributed a massive \$10,145.24 towards the cost of the Secretariat in 2022-2023 and this has greatly assisted the continued financial viability of the CWRG (SEQ). They also completely covered all costs to hold the Refuge Leader's forum in May this year which was a fantastic opportunity for all refuge managers to come together and discuss current issues and trends.

Memberships yielded a total of \$3,900. Social workers from the Royal Women's Brisbane Hospital raised almost \$700 to purchase gift cards for women and children in refuge and we received a further \$900 from the GiveNow platform. We greatly appreciate the thought and effort behind these very generous donations.


Strategic Planning Day

CWRG NETWORKING DAY

CWRG Networking Event was held on 6th of June 2023 at the Logan Central- Library. The event was attended well with over 42 members attending representing refuges from across SE Queensland.

The first session of the morning, refuge members broke into discussion groups and shared their ideas on current key issues and trends in refuge work, suggestions for meeting guest speakers 2023-24, ideas for sharing training costs and other resources.

Discussions were robust with the housing crisis (limited exiting options and affordability), child to parent violence, extended wait time for mental health support, supporting no income women and turnover of staffing identified as key issues identified by the sector. Workers identified Department of Housing, NDIS, Department Child Safety, Legal Aid and Vulnerable Persons Unit, Self-Care specialists and Department of Immigration as potential guest speakers.

Training needs identified across the refuge sector:

- · Technology GPS tracking, social media
- \cdot Parents Programs trauma, circle of security
- · Love Bytes healthy relationships
- · Cultural competence
- \cdot Shark Cage
- Circle of Security
- · Mental Health First Aic
- · Strangulation and coercive control
- · Strategies to manage behaviours of traumatised women and children. Child behaviour and mental health support
- · Cultural competency
- \cdot Safe and Together
- \cdot Mental Health and Alcohol and Other Drugs

One of the highlights of the day was the self-care presentation done by clinical psychologist Dr Samantha Brown. Dr Brown captivated her audience, discussing self-care strategies minimising the risk of vicarious trauma and reinforced the importance of looking after ourselves. Additionally, Dr Brown bought along a therapy dog who received lots of petting and attention.

Next attendees broke down to smaller working groups and brainstormed ways to reinvigorate the Refuge Support Worker Meetings, this was thoroughly supported by the workers present and it was agreed our next step was to survey all members to determine the future direction of these important meetings.

Lastly representatives of the Executive
Committee promoted refuge worker
participation in working groups facilitated by
CWRG executives. Participants were
encouraged to become part of a working group
where their thoughts and ideas could be
shared with the wider DFV sector.

The event was declared successful event with all members feeding back that the opportunity for face-to-face conversations, connections and peer support was highly valued.

Statewide Refuge Leaders Forum

In May this year, ChallengeDV facilitated the first QLD State-wide Refuge Leaders Forum. The forum was held over 2 days at Minter Ellison and was attended by approximately 40 members, representing over 25 refuges, travelling from Cairns, the Gold Coast and everywhere in between.

Day one began with a walk down memory lane for the refuge sector and led into some passionate discussions about how refuges can stay relevant in the domestic and family violence sector. Following on from this we discussed length of stays in refuge, had a presentation from DV Connect and then moved into afternoon discussions around First Nations Women and Children in refuge. The afternoon concluded with a fun activity of creating a "home" through art and craft, followed by some drinks and nibblies to connect with each other.

Day two focused on the housing crisis, support for CALD families in refuge, Police responses and High Risk Teams, and peer support. The afternoon involved an enthusiastic planning session where working groups were established for the following projects:

- Progressing partnerships
- Advocacy for change
- Networking
- Profiling refuges
- Blue book
- Data collection
- Affordable housing campaign

Through the support of Challenge DV, refuges from all over Queensland were supported to attend this event. Being able to spend two days as a group, discussing ways to overcome sector challenges, learn from each other, build new connections, all while being fed delicious food with an amazing view, was incredible.

The forum was a resounding success, filled with enthusiasm and excitement for the future. In addition, connections have been strengthened within the refuge sector and a number of North Queensland refuges have been attending the monthly CWRG meeting. CWRG is hoping that this will become an annual event.
